Metal badges were unsuitable because lugs chaffed the shirt and made holes and on to BM tunic had holes and had to be replaced. In April 1970 Treasury approval awaited for gratuitous issue (badges cost 14/6d each). (Initial expenditure £1,750)

Replaced out of KUA on normal kit maintenance w.e.f. 1 May 1970.

Both appear in Blue, Lovat and stone.

#### Observer badges

Qualified “Light Helicopter Observers” wear army observer badge. Pre 1974 army practise was to wear the brevet on lower left sleeve, ¼ inch over cuff – not certain if this was ever the case in RM. Switched to left pocket for Army 1974. (RM10/13/148 confirms RM Observers wear gold and silver thread badges on both blue and lovat uniform)

#### Air Gunners

Left breast – both pilot and observer badge appear in Dress Regulations in bullion versions – (Gold/silver on blue for blues and lovats, light blue/gold for No5W the AG badge only appears light blue/gold on blue.

APJI – those qualified wear army pattern badge, exists in same pattern as normal wings but not stone – (KD worn)

#### Parachute badges

WW2 – KSD wings for BD. Blues – pale blue or white on blue.  
Red on blue – unofficial – does not appear in any photos  
SBS pictured wearing wings on left breast pocket in blues WW2 – unofficial.  
30 AU wore wings on left arm – unofficial  
Other pictures show wings on lower left arm – unofficial and unit unknown  
The army pattern badge is worn, 2” below right shoulder seam  
Blue tunics – full size, gold and silver wire on dark blue  
Lovats – 2/3 size sold and silver wire on green  
Mess – miniature (2” by ¾”) gold and silver wire on scarlet  
Khaki – full size, white/ light blue on khaki drill  
Combats – as khaki.  
Jerseys – as khaki – frequently excluded from dress regs.

#### 46 COMMANDO BADGE. RMR 50 Anniversary Booklet

“In 1951 RMFVR Centres were given mobilisation responsibilities for certain units and sub-units, 48 (City of London) Commando RMFVR, 47 Commando RMFVR, Nos 4 and 5 SBS RMFVR, 535 Raiding flotilla 536, 537, and 53 Assault Flotillas (later Squadrons) and four naval beach units. In a 1956 change of organisation in the RMFVR, 47 and 48 Commandos were disbanded and 46 (VR) Commando was Formed and carried out annual training as a unit.” *Does this explain why so many post war 46 commando titles exist?*  
“...it was not until 1966 that the RMFVR became the RMR.”

## ROYAL MARINE BAND SERVICE SHOULDER TITLE (RMRI 106/?)

The bugler section and musician section officers and trained ranks to wear on jersey wool heavy with effect from 1/10/1979.

## 3 COMMANDO BRIGADE FORMATION INSIGNIA (RMRI 009/1997)

From 1<sup>st</sup> March 1997.

Black on green "Royal Marines Commando Flash" to be worn on both sleeves of outer garments of combat dress (arctic, temperate, tropical and dessert). Attached centrally 7mm below the shoulder seams. (General Service)

3 Cdo Bde RM, "red field service fighting knife" on a black background on the left outer sleeve on all types of combat dress. On leaving the Bde badge is to be removed. Army ranks continue to wear after leaving the brigade.

Bugle Major (Colour Sergeant) promoted Bugler QMS to wear rank insignia as for RSM and QMS.

## STAFF BANDMASTER (AUCC 26/62)

New badge – lyre surmounted by a crown surrounded by a laurel leaf suggested.

## RANK, BRANCH, SQ AND OTHER BADGES AFTER 1 APRIL 1964

(RMRO30/64)

Lovats Best Suit

- GCB will not be worn
- all other badges to be worn
- gold on green, 2/3 size. Band badges will be metal as present
- same position for wearing as on present blue suit
- bronze beret, collar badges and letters RM to be worn

Second Lovat Suit

- rank, branch, King's, Parachute and Royal Yacht badges only
- SQ badges may be worn (at man's expense)

Blue and Khaki Drill Uniforms

- rank, GCB, Kings, Parachute and Royal Yacht badges will be worn as at present
- Band and buglers branch badges only will be worn
- SQ badges will not be worn

### Obsoluscent Uniform

- after 1<sup>st</sup> April 1964, RM Commando Flashes, the dagger formation sign and Amphibious Warfare Flash will not be issued to regular corps or worn by them
- can be worn on BDs during transition to Lovats.
- Branch, skill and misc badges will continue to be issued to RMFVR only until stocks are exhausted

proposal to introduce badge for wear on JWH, agreed and introduced by RMRO 126/86)

### SLIP ON RANK BADGES (AMD BR81 28/2/79)

Officers

JWH – Black on green

Combats – army pattern brown on DPM

Training – black on green

Shirt Sleeve Order – metal bronze

Lovat – lovat coloured socks

WOs/NCOs

JWH – army pattern dark brown on green



Combat and training – army pattern brown on DPM  
Lovat/Shirt Sleeve Order – stay-bright on leather wrist band or white on stone  
chevrons as appropriate as worn as present.

ADC BADGES – (Army Dress Regs 1934)

Worn by ex – ADCs Royal Cypher and Crown worn in miniature,  
immediately below the crossed sword and baton for generals, immediately above the  
stars for Colonels and Brigadiers, the crown of the Royal Cypher will also serve as the  
crown for the badge of rank.
